Call to Order and Pledge of Allegiance: The meeting called to order at 9:02 a.m.

<u>Superintendent's Perspective</u>: The Friendship School's Principal, Andrea Simmons, presented an overview of the school's NEASC & NAEYC* accreditations including the processes and criteria to achieve these certifications (*New England Association of Schools & Colleges, National Association of Education of Young Children)

Information from the Executive Director

The following Information from the Executive Director was included in the packet. <u>Hiring update:</u> A three-year snapshot of monthly hiring and resignation data for the following job classifications; teachers, administrative staff, non-certified school-based staff, and non-certified twelve- month staff. In addition to the traditional format, the intent of the trending data is to provide additional insight to assist in staff retention and areas of need.

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Legislative update: Mrs. Ericson reviewed the bills most impacting the districts, especially HB 5433, HB5433, An Act Concerning The Creation of a Special Education Excess Cost Cooperative. She distributed copies of Commissioner of Education, Miguel Cardona's testimony as presented to the CT General Assembly Education Committee on March 9, 2020 regarding a series of important education-related proposals on the agenda. Agency updates:

- In January, 2020, the Executive Committee was informed that LEARN's Dual Language and Arts Magnet Middle School (DLAMMS) could no longer remain at the 51 Daniels Avenue, Waterford location and must close due to the deteriorating building condition. The school also was unable to fill the 150 lottery seats set by the State for the past two years. The decision to close the program was made after an 8-year search to find another suitable building location. In addition, there are many new magnet school choice options in the region. In order to decide next steps, the Executive Director surveyed staff and families and hosted three focus group sessions to determine if there was a large interest in continuing to attend the middle school @ the Goodwin University campus. The feedback from the majority of families was that the East Hartford location was not viable. The Executive Director announced to the board in February and again in March that after 8 years of searching unsuccessfully for a building to house the school, DLAMMS will be closing its doors permanently at the end of the 2019-2020 school year
- Marine Science Magnet High School principal search update. There are 30 applicants and the review process next steps are ongoing.
- COVID 19 updates: As events unfold, communications are distributed to staff and families throughout LEARN schools. The Student Support Services 4th Annual Disability Summit at the Mohegan Sun Convention Center will be rescheduled to a future date. HR is reviewing policies for hourly employees should schools close. LEARN schools will close according to the decisions made by the towns in which they reside. The RESC Alliance is looking at distance learning to assist towns if/when schools are closed-The Commissioner of Education stated that towns are legally liable to provided EQUITY. LEARN Associate Executive Director, Dr. Ryan Donlon, hosted an Alternative Learning Forum with the districts' Curriculum Directors and Assistant Principals to collaborate on pre-k through 12th grade level packets to send home in case of school closure. Superintendents will meet tomorrow, Friday, March 13, 2020, to discuss their Regional Pandemic Planning

<u>Old Business</u>: While the LEARN Board is not required to vote to close a LEARN program, the Executive Director, brought it before the board for a vote. **Motion: To approve the closure of the Dual Language & Arts Magnet Middle Schools at the end of the 2019-2020 school year made by Daniels, second by Volkmann. Abstained: Christopher Jones Motion Passed**

<u>New Business</u>: National School Lunch Program-Healthy Food Certification Statement for 2020-2021- *To participate in the program, the Connecticut State Department of Education requires all district governing boards to vote "yes or no" on the following 2 motions as written by the State:*

9.1a Motion 1: For Healthy Food Option-Pursuant to Connecticut General Statutes (C.G.S.) Section 10-215f, the board of education or governing authority certifies that all food items offered for sale to students in the schools under its jurisdiction, and not exempted from the Connecticut Nutrition Standards published by the Connecticut State Department of Education, will comply with the Connecticut Nutrition Standards during the period of July 1, 2020, through June 30, 2021. This certification shall include all food offered for sale to students separately from reimbursable meals at all times and from all sources, including but not limited to school stores, vending machines, school cafeterias, culinary programs, and any fundraising activities on school premises sponsored by the school or non-school organizations and groups.

Motion made by Esposito, second by Jones Vote: yes Passed unanimously

9.1b Motion 2: For Food Exemptions-The board of education or governing authority will allow the sale to students of food items that do not meet the Connecticut Nutrition Standards provided that the following conditions are met: 1.) the sale is in connection with an event occurring after the end of the regular school day or on the weekend; 2). The sale is at the location of the event; and 3). the food items are not sold from a vending machine or school store. An "event" is an occurrence that involves more than just a regularly scheduled practice, meeting, or extracurricular activity. For example, soccer games, school plays, and interscholastic debates are events but soccer practices, play rehearsals, and debate team meetings are not. The "regular school day" is the period from midnight before 30 minutes after the end of the official school day. "Location" means where the event is being held, and must be the same place as the food sales.
