**Regional Educational Services Centers (RESCs)** are nonprofit, fee-for-service, public education agencies with a mission to provide quality, cost-effective education resources, programs, and services to the state's public schools. Since their formation in 1972 (10-66a), RESCs have saved public schools millions of dollars.

In the 1990s, the six RESCs formed the **RESC Alliance** to create greater access to resources and savings for all Connecticut public schools. Through the Alliance, access to one RESC means access to the resources at any RESC.

- Governed by an executive board composed of local school districts' Board of Education members
- Responsive to local needs and interdistrict opportunities 🕑
- Dedicated to supporting local school districts to improve teaching, learning and student achievement

- Collaborators that facilitate partnerships with many different key stakeholders including the Connecticut State Department of Education (CSDE) and the Office of Early Childhood (OEC)

# **2022 RESC ALLIANCE LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES**

#### Improving Outcomes for All Students

In order for RESCs to continue demonstrating substantial cost savings to the state, we must be adequately funded in order to keep pace with program-cost increases over the years.

#### ► MAGNET SCHOOL FUNDING REQUEST | ► SCHOOL READINESS REQUEST

Enact an 8% increase for RESC operated magnet schools to sustain CT's high quality integrated regional magnet schools for the nearly 13,000 enrolled students.

- Over 10 years, ECS increased by 13% while RESC magnet grant increased by 2%.
- Magnet schools require reliable funding from the state to ensure students are offered high-quality, integrated school options for their child's education.
- RESC magnets provide highquality and equitable education environments that increase student achievement and reduce racial, ethnic, and economic isolation through regional programming.

Increase funding for OEC's full-day/full-year, schoolday/school year, part-day/ part year and extended day programs for students




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## TEACHER DIVERSITY AND RECRUITMENT REQUEST

To address MTR for all districts while supporting workforce development, designate \$5.5 million dollars annually to support the effort of districts partnering with a Residency Program committed to certifying teachers of color.

- In school year 2020-21, educators of color (10%) are underrepresented relative to the number of students of color (45%) in the State of Connecticut and well below the national average of 20%.
- While well intentioned, the funding mechanism enacted for MTR for Residency Programs within the 2022-23 biennial budget is inadequate to meet the needs of recruiting and retaining teachers of color across all CT public schools.
- The successful **CT Teacher Residency Program** should be expanded through State investment.



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
